

British Garden Centres helps Kent school to harness the power of plants in its new green library

Family-owned chain, British Garden Centres has been helping students reconnect with nature after installing a green oasis in their school library. Tonbridge Grammar School's library has been completely transformed into a healthy and inspiring environment for students to research, study and read for pleasure with the help of indoor houseplants.

The high-achieving grammar school with academy status worked with Paddock Green Garden Centre (part of the British Garden Centres family) when it wanted to refresh its school library at the heart of its site. The library is a key resource in supporting reading and research across the curriculum at Tonbridge.

Having redeveloped the book collection over the last 5 years, Tonbridge Grammar School's librarian, Ruth Maloney, turned her attention to the physical surroundings. Inspired by Year 9 student projects, she decided to pursue a long-held ambition to bring plants, and a breath of fresh air, into the library. With the support and expertise of Tom Cook, British Garden Centre's Houseplant expert, they sought to create a library with a peaceful, calm, and thought-provoking atmosphere. It was a natural step to include the benefits of plants and doing so has proved extremely successful.

In total, Paddock Green Garden Centre generously provided 161 plants at a cost price for the new and improved library. These included Dracaena, Monstera, Kentia palms, Calathea, and Ceropegia. It is a well-known fact that houseplants promote positive feelings of relaxation, calm and well-being and remove harmful toxins and chemicals from the air. Research demonstrates that adding plants to a classroom environment will help reduce student anxiety and sickness.

The resulting space, paid for by donations to the school's Enrichment Fund and generously supported by British Garden Centres, is proving to be an extremely popular place for book lovers and plant enthusiasts alike. The addition of the greenery provides a secondary purpose for the space. What was a thriving book collection is now housed in a physical environment that reflects its value and popularity with the students.



A Year 12 Student said: "Since the addition of the plants to the library, I have noticed that the tranquil atmosphere has attracted so many more students to come in at break times to read and study. It creates a very welcoming and caring environment, especially as students are involved with tending to the plants' needs. The library now has a strikingly verdant appearance and makes everyone feel more connected to both the books and the natural world".

Ruth Maloney, Librarian at Tonbridge Grammar School said: "When the opportunity to refurbish our library arose, I had high aims. We are extremely fortunate to have such a thriving and well-supported school library, but the room was clinical and uninviting. Inspired by some of our Year 9 Community Projects, I wanted to realise a long-held ambition to bring plants into the space. The connection with British Garden Centres and their support has allowed us to realise this vision fully, not one or two plants growing slowly, but a lush oasis within which our books reside. We are planning on this being the beginning of Tonbridge Grammar School. This is the start of a school-wide greening project with the library at its heart. This is a wonderful opportunity for our students and demonstrates how highly the library is valued by the school."
